Close to Rock View and on the way north to Iwokrama, is thebeautiful village of Surama set in a savannah within the rainforest and surrounded by mountains. It was here that Charles Waterton passed through in 1812 in search of the secrets of the useful Wourali poison known as Curare that led him to become famed as the Father to modern day medicine. Waterton was so stunned by this spot that he wrote in his memoirs "The finest park that England boasts falls far short of this delightful scene".



The lodge is located directly off the main road connecting Georgetown to Lethem, making us a perfect transportation hub for all your Rupununi adventures. Rock View Lodge offers eight private guest rooms featuring netted beds, bathroom, electricity and drinking water. Hammocks are hung on the front verandah of each room, perfect for a relaxing afternoon siesta.

A palm thatched benab is available for relaxation, meetings and workshops. The Rock View swimming pool, surrounded by boulders and a succulent garden is ideal for relaxation and refreshing exercise. Rocking gently in the shade of the cashew tree you can relax in a hammock with a cold drink and a book after a day picnicking, boating, riding, birding or hiking. Meal service begins with coffee and tea at dawn for bird watchers, followed by home-cooked breakfast, lunch, and dinner served under the old mango trees.
